The end of troubleshooting?

- In early days: We relied on a small collection of general tools to fix almost all problems.
- Today: We rely on a variety specific fixes with little generality.

Troubleshooting Basics Classic Mac OS - Basic "fix-it" tools were the norm Many of these tools are now retired...

- Check for Extensions conflicts
- Reinstall System and/or Finder
- Rebuild the Desktop
- Slam computer sharply with fist

Troubleshooting Basics Mac OS X: A mix of Classic and new tools Most still used only rarely...

- Restart your Mac!
- Run Disk Utility's Disk First Aid
- Do a Safe Boot
- Use Terminal...or..
 - Boot in single user mode

- Use diagnostic tools
- Use "fixit" tools

Bugs & Fixes: Delete files to prevent crashes in OS X 10.5.6

Apple has recently posted several articles that offer advice on how to prevent crashes and freezes related to the <u>Mac OS X 10.5.6 update</u>. The fixes all involve deleting files, most often heretofore little-known system files.

Prevent a Configuring Installation error

When installing an OS X update, the Installer may stall or freeze at the stage where a "Configuring Installation..." message appears. The good news is that this bug has been eradicated in Mac OS X 10.5.6. The only problem is that you may still see this error while attempting to install the very 10.5.6 update that fixes it! If so, the solution is to go to the /Library/Updates folder and delete its contents.

I am not certain (and <u>Apple does not explain in the relevant</u> <u>article</u>) exactly why deleting this folder's contents eliminates the Configuring Installation error. But after a bit of investigation, I at least know a bit about the overall function of this folder. RELATED MAC OS X ARTICLES

Bugs & Fixes: OS X 10.5.5 causes hassles for some apps

As with any OS update, <u>Mac OS X 10.5.5</u>, released nearly two weeks ago, is a bit While the update fixes a slew of bugs, it inevitably introduces a few new ones. In s the bug is more the result of a third-party application having problems with the up than the update itself. Here are two examples:

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Bugs & Fixes: C causes hassles

Adobe printing errors

According to an <u>Adobe TechNote</u>, after updating to Mac OS X 10.5.5, "printing to certain printers from Illustrator, InDesign or InCopy results in pages rendering with incorrect scaling and/or rotation." Based on reports in <u>Adobe's forums</u>, the most common specific symptom appears to be that, when printing to Adobe PDF 8.0, a resulting image is half its expected size.

• Example: After 10.5.5, EyeTV display has green-purple cast

 "Cause" is OpenGL in 10.5.5

• Work-around is...

.plist file edit work-around: In Terminal: enter: <u>defaults write com.elgato.eyetv</u> "Use OpenGL" -bool NO

Delete .plist files and Uninstall/Reinstall



Zinio Reader Rejection If you use the Zinio reader (www.zinio .com) to subscribe to digital versions of magazines, you may find that it refuses to open or download your issues after you transfer your data to a new Mac or restore a hard drive. To fix this, delete the Zinio application and a trio of files located in your user folder/Library/Preferences: ContentGuard, com.zinio.reader.plist, and Zinio.plist. Be sure to empty the Trash after putting the files there. Finally, reinstall Zinio Reader, and the application should once again see you as a valid subscriber.

Replace missing (kext) file

Snapz Pro X 2 Audio Woes Ambrosia Software's Snapz Pro X 2 (****; macworld.com/1473)

isn't just for taking static screen captures. If you have the \$69 version, you can just as easily make a movie of what's happening on your display—and even include a soundtrack. With the Snapz Pro palette open, click on Movie and then choose the Mac Audio Track option. One glitch: you may not be able to select the audio check box. If that's the case, your Ambrosia-AudioSupport.kext file, stored in /System/ Library/Extensions, is missing in action (probably lost when you reinstalled Mac OS X). Reinstall Snapz Pro to get everything working again.

Reinstall Language Files?

Bugs & Fixes: When updating Microsoft Office fails

It happened with the recent 12.1.3 update to Microsoft Office 2008. It will inevitably happen again with the just-released 12.1.4 update. In fact, it's a long-standing glitch in Microsoft's update process, one that plagued numerous versions. What happens is this:

The Microsoft AutoUpdate application notifies you that an update is available. You select to download it and run the Installer. And that's about as far as you go. The Installer complains "No version of the software found on volume" and the installation halts. You scratch your head, fully aware that the relevant software is indeed available, and wonder what went wrong.

The most likely cause is that, to save disk space, you previously removed unwanted language-specific files in Office. You can do this with utilities such as <u>Macaroni</u>. Having done this, the Microsoft Installer no longer recognizes the Office software as updatable.

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- Office update won't install.
- Quick fix: reinstall Office to return language files
- Otherwise...edit package_updatable file

Bugs & Fixes: Safari 3.2 plus Input Managers equals crashes

The recently released <u>Safari 3.2</u> and <u>3.2.1 updates</u> have triggered a spate of complaints, claiming that the new versions are crashing all the time. While there may be multiple causes for this symptom, there is one cause that likely accounts for the vast majority of the complaints: Safari add-ons, most especially Input Managers. These include <u>PithHelmet/SIMBL</u> and <u>AcidSearch</u>. This is not new to Safari 3.2.x. A similar precipitation of crashes was reported immediately after updating to earlier versions of Safari.

As noted in this Apple document on the Cocoa Application Framework: "The automatic loading of bundles located in InputManagers folders is now officially unsupported. The conditions for valid input manager bundle is further tightened. This functionality is likely to be disabled in a future release."

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- Input Managers modify the way applications work.
- They are no longer supported by Apple.
 Avoid using them if possible.

Solve Console errors



Tracking Down Strange Errors A puzzling stream of "swizzle errors," reported in my

Console log (/Applications/Utilities), seemed to coincide with sluggish performance on my Mac. A posting at Cocoabuilder.com pointed to Script Software's \$20 ChatFX (******¹; macworld.com/ 2619)—specifically the ChatFXloader item in the /Library/InputManagers folderas the likely culprit. Sure enough, when I used ChatFX's Uninstaller to remove the program, the errors vanished. The general lesson here is worth noting: when you're troubleshooting a new, mysterious problem with your Mac, check folders such as Application Enhancers and InputManagers (in both the/Library and your user folder/Library folders) for items installed by third-party software you've acquired recently. If you spot a new addition, remove it from the relevant Library folder and restart your Mac. If the symptom disappears, you've found the cause.

Most of the time, I'm busy ferreting out the latest in freshlyminted bugs so that I can report them to you here. Every once in a while, however, it pays to take a look back at a bug that has stood up to the test of time and still remains unfixed.

One such frustrating bug involves the Finder. It occurs when you select to save items to the Desktop. I see this most frequently when saving Web pages from Safari. After selecting to save a Web Archive file, for example, I go to the Desktop only to find no trace of the file anywhere. Even if I start typing the first letters of the file's name—which should highlight the file—nothing happens. Blurry iPhone photos

Many iPhone owners are complaining about a bug in the <u>iPhone 2.2 Update</u> that images are displayed. The problem notably affects photos received as e-mail atta When viewed in Mail, the attached image appears fine. However, if you select to and then view the image in the Photos app, the photo appears blurred or fuzzy.

On this <u>Apple Discussions thread</u>, you'll find posts from a half dozen or more people complaining about these blurred photos. <u>Two</u> other <u>Web pages</u> report the same symptom and have posted blurry photos to prove their point.
